## Call for Short Responses to The Source of Magic

We feel that there is much still to be said about this relationship and, as one way of initiating discussion on this topic, we would like to use Sean Wilcock paper *The Source of Magic* as a jumping off point. We feel that the paper raises many questions for Performance Magic studies and would like to invite writers to submit short pieces responding to the paper.

We don't wish to be prescriptive, we simply ask for responses to Wilcock's fascinating paper, but as an illustration we personally found these topics of interest:

- What are the links between trends in Performance Magic and trends in fantasy and science fiction writing?
- How does Wilcock's discussion of distance and magical objects relate to Performance Magic?
- How does Wilcock's discussion of language relate to the development of Performance Magic?
